Internet streaming video of the City of Beavercreek's government access cable channel 10. Residents and individuals who do not subscribe to cable television, or who live outside of Beavercreek, can watch Channel 10's programs and announcements.

Go to the City's Web site, www.ci.beavercreek.oh.us, and click Beavercreek Media in the upper-left corner. This takes you to Beavercreek Media's main page, where the live feed will appear after a few seconds. A larger window can be viewed by clicking the link below the default window; this can be used to view the Channel's public service announcements. A high-speed Internet connection is needed to properly view the feed.

Channel 10's main purpose is to make Beavercreek city government more accessible to the public. This includes live coverage and replays of City Council, Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals meetings.

Local events are highlighted on Channel 10 such as Memorial Day and Veterans' Day ceremonies, 4th of July Parade, dedications, and special events such as last year's 25th Anniversary Street Art Beaver Auction.

Channel 10 plays an important role during election season with coverage of local political forums and informational videos of City ballot issues, as well as live local returns on election night. Informational and educational programs airing on Channel 10 are provided by the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Department of Aging, Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation, and NASA. The Beavercreek Police Department regularly provides crime and drug safety and awareness programs to inform and educate viewers.

A unique and very popular feature of Channel 10 is the public service announcements shown between video programs. These text-based messages feature information from the City of Beavercreek about road construction projects, recreational opportunities, community events and more. Non-profit and community organizations and charities also utilize this service to advertise upcoming events.

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GRASS HEIGHT REGULATIONS



We would like to remind everyone that grass needs to be kept below ten inches in height. Any parcel of land with grass exceeding ten inches will have a sign posted listing the violation. If the property owner fails to comply with the grass ordinance within five days, the City will mow the grass at the owner's expense, and a lien will be placed on the property. Any parcels over five acres only



require that a fifty-foot buffer be mowed around the entire property. Please be aware that no notices will be mailed out beforehand. If you have any questions feel free to call Planning and Zoning at 427-5512.

RESIDENTIAL VEHICLE PARKING GUIDELINES

The City Planning and Zoning Department reminds everyone of the yard parking ordinance currently in effect. No vehicles are allowed to be parked in the front yard of any property within the City of Beavercreek. All vehicles, including recreational vehicles, boats and trailers, must be kept on a paved surface or in the rear or side yard.

Any commercial or industrial vehicles over 10,000 pounds may not be stored on any residential property outside of a fully enclosed building. New gravel driveways are also prohibited, but existing gravel driveways may be maintained.

TEMPORARY SIGNS NOT PERMITTED ON PUBLIC RIGHTS-OF-WAY



Temporary signs yard or garage sale signs, house for sale lead-in signs, etc. are not allowed to be placed at street corners, intersections, or on utility poles. Temporary

signs are only allowed on the sign owners own property. Any signs placed in the public right-of-way on main thoroughfares, utility poles or at street corners or intersections will be removed by the City.

VACATION BLISS OR BLUES, IT'S UP TO YOU

The bad guys are quite aware of the bounty available to them during summer vacations. They know what tell-tale signs to look for when selecting a house to break into. You must know them as well in order to discourage crooks from targeting your home and turning your vacation bliss into the blues.

The idea is to make it appear as if someone is home.

- Cancel mail and newspaper delivery or ask a trusted neighbor to pick them up each day
- Have a vehicle parked in your driveway
- Have a neighbor use your trash container and take it to curb on pickup day
- Have someone cut the lawn when needed
- Leave contact information with family or trusted neighbor. If your house has an alarm system, give code to a trusted person in case it goes off
- Use multi-setting timers to turn on and off lights and radios at various times throughout house
- Don't keep blinds or curtains closed for the entire time that you are away

- Keep credit card in sight at all times. The imprinted information is easily and quickly copied
- Protect your personal information identity theft is the #1 crime

BEAVERCREEK POLICE DEPARTMENT AWARDED RADAR



The Beavercreek Police Department received a new radar unit from the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Governor's Highway Safety Office. The radar was for the Department's participation last year in traffic programs such as "Click it or Ticket" and other

various alcohol enforcement countermeasures. Of the 975 police agencies in Ohio, 220 received new equipment. The Beavercreek Police Department was one of only two departments in Greene County to receive a radar unit. Sheriff Sub-Station

The Sheriff's sub-station is operational; you might have noticed the sign in front of Fire Station 1 indicating the location of this office. The Sheriff's deputies assigned to Beavercreek Township work exclusively out of the facility. They have the ability to communicate with the Sheriff's Office in Xenia via computer hookup to provide excellent service to the unincorporated portion of Beavercreek Township. The newest Township facility is a multi-use building. It is a fire station; it is a Sheriff's sub-station; it is a communications center; and it is an Emergency Operations Center backup for the County. The facility provides a training room that is used by the Fire Department, the Sheriff's Office, and is available for large meetings of local government and service organizations in the community.

Possible Ohio Constitutional Amendment on State Expenditures

From the editor: The Ohio Legislature has adopted legislation to cap State of Ohio expenditures. It also adopted legislation permitting the promulgators of the TEL amendment to request that it not be on the November ballot. As this newsletter goes to press, the latter has not been done as far as I know. There is also a possibility of litigation by signers of the petitions who might object to the issue being removed from the election process.

<u>TEL: Tax and Expenditure Limitation Amendments</u>, or TABOR: The Taxpayers Bill of Rights

In response to the article in the Winter 2006 InTouch on the interpretation of an elector, I include the following definition. The definition of an elector in the State of Ohio Constitution is in Section 5.01 - Who May Vote. "Every citizen of the United States, of the age of eighteen years, who has been a resident of the state, county, township, or ward, such time as may be provided by law, and has been registered to vote for thirty days, has the qualifications of an elector, and is entitled to vote at all elections. Any elector who fails to vote in at least one election during any period of four consecutive years shall cease to be an elector unless he again registers to vote." (amended November, 1977.)

<u>TEL Section 14 (E) Tax and spending Limitations on</u> <u>Political Subdivision (1)</u>

"No political subdivision of the state shall (a) increase aggregate political subdivision expenditures for a fiscal year by an amount that exceeds the aggregate political subdivision expenditures for the previous fiscal year beyond the allowable rate for a political subdivision, (b) levy a new tax, or (c) increase the rate of an existing tax, without first obtaining the approval of a majority of electors in that political subdivision."

<u>TEL Section (G) Construction and Enforcement;</u> <u>Miscellaneous (4)</u>

"In any case of a conflict between any provision of this section and any other provision contained in this constitution, the provisions of this section shall control. All laws in force as of the effective date of this amendment and not inconsistent herewith shall remain in full force and effect until amended or repealed by the general assembly or pursuant to a statewide initiative or referendum. The general assembly shall repeal or amend all laws that are not consistent with the provisions of this section to conform herewith."

Summary: These sections define elector and would require the general assembly to modify language in the Ohio Revised Code that would be in conflict with this Constitutional Amendment.

Any proposed new bond issue or tax or increase in existing tax rates would have to be approved by a majority of all registered voters at the local level. (Registered voters include individuals who have moved or died. A voter is only eliminated from the poll list after not voting in the last four years.) The following are some examples using recent elections. In the November 2005 election, the City of Beavercreek had 30,391 registered voters; only 49.84 percent went to the polls. Even if 100 percent of those who went to the polls voted Yes on the Police Levy, the issue would have failed. There were 33,851 registered voters for the Fire Levy issue; 50.17 percent went to the polls. The issue was passed by 60 percent of those who voted. If the TABOR amendment had been in effect the issue would have failed. There were 34,945 Greene County registered voters eligible to vote on our school renewal issue; 16,355 actually voted (46.8 percent); again, under TABOR, the issue would have failed.

In the next five years, we will have tax issues expiring for many services that heavily rely on funding via levy issues. Under TEL, these levies will be almost impossible to pass. The amendment would result in the severe reduction of services and the inability to replace aging equipment or update facilities.

The proposed amendment would make no allowance for a political subdivision where the removal or reduction of State of Federal aid occurs. If State or Federal aid declines in the current year, any attempt to replace the lost State money with local revenue sources would count against the current year's expenditure limitation, although the amendment definition (F)(1) "the aggregate political subdivision expenditures" shall not include expenditures of moneys received from federal or state government."

To the extent that a school district, county, township, city, library or other local government relies upon State aid, the amount of that State aid in the local government's base year is not part of the expenditure limit allowance. A decision by the State to re-prioritize its expenditure would leave the local government with lowered income and no authority to replace existing spending, except through the voter approval process requesting additional funds (levy) and a second request to increase the expenditure limit – even though the actual spending is not increased (which is dependent on getting a majority of registered voters to approve).

How will counties, school, libraries, townships and cities be affected if this amendment passes? The result will be a reduction in services or having to go to the voters to request additional property taxes for the continuation of services.

Programs and services provided to township residents would be the most heavily impacted. Police, fire, EMS, recreation, cemeteries, zoning, and parks may all see severe budget cuts to accommodate spending limitations resulting from TEL.

Levies passed by residents would authorize only the collection of the revenue. A jurisdiction would have to put an additional measure on the ballot to spend any revenue collected over the growth restriction from the previous year. Elections cost money and this would increase the expenses of the jurisdictions. This restriction applies even in emergency situations or the passage of a bond issue.

We have many examples of cooperation between and among political jurisdictions in our community. The schools, Township and City coordinate and cooperate during inclement weather to maximize the safety of transporting students to school. The City and Township jointly own the Charles and Anna Mae Lofino Senior Adult and Cultural Center. The County owns land adjacent to Rotary Park and permits enhancement of the Park, which is owned by the Township and managed by the City. (The Township provides capital improvements while the City and the Township share in the deficit of Park operations.) The Beavercreek High School cross-country track team benefits from using the Township's Phillips Park, and Rotary Park for practices. The girls softball team plays at Rotary Park. The City, Township, County, and Township Park Board each own portions of the Creekside Bikeway and connectors, with the County providing maintenance of the system. The Township owns the Beavercreek Branch Library building that is managed and operated by the Greene County Library Board.

There are many examples of public/private partnerships in Beavercreek, especially in the area of sports. One of the least publicized partnerships is with the Greene County Career Center. The Career Center provides many Adult Career Development Programs. The focus of the Adult full time skill training programs is to prepare unemployed and/or underemployed adults for the work force. Such training reflects local needs and is supported by adult education advisory committee input. The Adult Education Center offers job preparation skill training programs that are well distributed across the career-technical and adult service areas. Greene County Career Center's Adult Education Center is fully accredited with the North Central Association Commission. Most programs are articulated with local colleges and universities in our area, meaning adults completing programs at the Career Center are earning college credit.

The Greene County Career Center operates programs in the area of criminal justice, firefighting and EMS, heating and ventilation and air conditioning, medical office and nursing, CPR, customized business and industry training, and more. Programs are customized by Greene County Career Center's highly trained staff to meet the needs of a specific business or industry. Companies served by the GCCC include Beavercreek Township, Greene County Sheriff's Office and other County Departments, Phillips Industries, Unison Industries – Elano Division, Yellow Springs Instruments, and more.

All of these services will be affected should the proposed amendment pass.



FIRE DEPARTMENT NEW HIRES

Recent passage of the Beavercreek fire levy is enabling the Fire Department to bring their level of service up to community expectations. Part of this effort is in the hiring of three full-time firefighters in June to fill vacancies created by personnel retirements.

Michael McDufford (pictured left) was hired onto the Beavercreek Township Fire

Department on February 2004 as a Level II Firefighter and EMT-Basic. He was promoted to shifted part-time in August 2005 and assigned to Station 1. McDufford has obtained Paramedic certification since being hired.

Tyson Dean (center) has been a member of the Beavercreek Township Fire Department since February 2004. He was hired as a part-time Level II Firefighter and EMT-Basic. Dean has since received his Paramedic certification and was promoted to shifted part-time and assigned to Station 3 in January 2005.

Lee Poulos (right) has been serving the Beavercreek Township Fire Department since August 2003. He was hired as a part-time Level I Firefighter and Paramedic. Poulos received his Level II Firefighter certification, and was promoted to shifted part-time and assigned to Station 2 in January 2005.



All three of these firefighters are assets to the Beavercreek Fire Township Fire Department. The Department endeavors to hire full-time firefighters from its parttime ranks whenever possible. Please join the Fire Department in welcoming them as full-time career firefighters.

The Department also recently hired six new part-time firefighters through the Miami

Valley Fire/EMS Alliance testing process. These firefighters completed the Sinclair Community College firefighter program to obtain certification as firefighters in the state of Ohio. The Department recruits young people interested in pursuing a career in the fire and emergency medical services.

These new recruits are able to get experience in the fire and EMS service that will enable them to pursue a full-time career. Many of them will get their paramedic training through the Beavercreek Township Fire Department and prove to be valuable employees to the Department. Many of our firefighters that have gone through Beavercreek's part-time program are currently working not only on the Beavercreek Township Fire Department but also for many of the surroundings communities.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT RETURNS TO BEAVERCREEK

Twenty-six years ago, National Night Out was born. The theme for that first year and several years after was, "Turn on Porch Lights and Light the Darkness" and "Give Criminals a Going-Away Party." Since that time, National Night Out, which is celebrated annually on the first Tuesday of August, has grown to include over 25 thousand neighborhoods with over 10 million citizens participating yearly.

National Night Out has evolved over the years. The themes are as varied as the communities that celebrate it. But one purpose remains constant; bringing neighbors and police together in partnerships to keep communities safe.

As unbelievable as it may be, studies indicate that 85 percent of American citizens don't even know their next door neighbors, nor do they know their police officers. With this in mind, the Beavercreek Crime Prevention Unit organizes Beavercreek's National Night Out to attract people of all ages. It allows Beavercreek's citizens to meet their neighbors and police officers while having fun. Beavercreek's 2006 National Night Out will be held at Lofino Park on Tuesday, August 1 from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. The attractions for this year include a live band, lots of classic and custom cars, Greene County Prosecutor's KIDS identification, face painting by Beavercreek officers, Red Cross (Homeland Security), llamas and alpacas from Spittin' Creek Llama and Alpaca Farm, and Jingles the Balloon Man. There will be special guests attending this year's event, including Star Wars Stormtroopers and McGruff the Crime Dog. Snacks will be provided by the Boy Scouts.

There is no entrance fee for the classic / custom car show. A dash plaque will be given to the drivers of these great vehicles.

Plan on attending, for once you do, you will keep returning to this great event. And after all, it will give you a chance meet several of your Beavercreek Police Officers.







THE LOFINO SENIOR CENTER







The United States Environmental Protection Agency has ten things you can do to prevent stormwater runoff pollution:

- Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveway, sidewalks and roads
- Never dump anything down storm drains
- Vegetate bare spots in your yard
- Compost your yard waste
- Avoid pesticides; learn about Integrated Pest Management (IPM)
- Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces
- Take your car to the car wash instead of washing it in the driveway
- Check car for leaks and recycle motor oil; never dump used motor oil
- Pick up after your pet
- Have your septic tank pumped and system inspected regularly

HELP KEEP THE STORM DRAINS OPEN

Many people do not realize that blowing grass clippings into the road can cause storm drains to clog. This is especially true in areas where curbs channel rainwater. When storm drains clog, flooding occurs resulting in property damage. Please direct your clippings away from the street.

ANIMAL NUISANCE LAW STRENGTHENED

Beavercreek City Council recently passed new legislation regulating property damage conducted by animals.

Section 91.08 of the Beavercreek Codified Ordinances says that "digging or defecating by any dog or companion animal on any public property, right-of-way, or private property in the City" is not permitted. The owner or individual responsible for the animal must "remove all feces deposited by such dog from all places." The exception to this rule is the property of the animal's owner or keeper.

The ordinance also prohibits service animals for legally blind, deaf or otherwise handicapped individuals from being removed from public property, rights-of-way, and private property onto which the general public is invited provided that the service animal accompanies the person it was trained to assist.
